

Here is not anie Christian (I am fure) but in heart will relent, and with great admis ration, lift by his epes toward beas uen, and ftande a mazed at the mic. ked practifes of fix of the most notors ous wicked wit

des that ever they heard of: who (giving both bodyes and foules to eternall damnation) committed to many inhumatine Durders, so many strangs kobberies, Pillages, and Riottes; spoyling both Come and Cattle: causing strange haple and tempets, and such like annoyances to the inhabitantes of Germanic, that I thinke it a matter wouthy to be kept in memorie, whereby the shamefull end of such malasactors, may serve as a notable example to malafactors, may ferue as a notable example to our eyes, a griefe to the godly, and a terrour to the wicked and reprobate people. The names of theis vile offendours, and of their wicked dealings, here: after followeth. Als.

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fitth, Paule Gamperle, alies Poppenhamor.

Decond, Anne Gamperle, wife to the faid Paule.

Third, Simon Gamperle, 7 their two Sonnes. fourth, Iacob Gamperle,

fifth, Vllrich Seheltibaum, 3rmozour.

Sixth, George Smalles, Caplor.

These lire persons, being many yeeres (before this) helde in great fulpition for practifing Witchcraft, pet not any lufticient proofe thereof, were now taken altogeather, neare to the Cowne of Derwenge, in a Caue of Mault depe in the ground, where many times before they had likewife met, and as they thought, there to remaine fill fecure from the knowledge of their neighbours, fel to their accultomed practices : and by their witchcraftes rayled to great a florme or tempels, that all the Townes and Uillages were greatly indamaged thereby: But God not luffering thele bile offens bours to remaine any longer budiscouered, brought all their actions to light: and by the howling of a Dogge Aroken madd with the fearefulines of that tempest, certaine of their neighbours were broughs to the layd Caue or Clault, where they weare all fire attached, and the next day, being the rritic of Auly, were brought before the Gouernour of Man-

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chen, who finding them guiltie by their examina-

tions, commaunded them to prison,

But now marke what happened : the Gouers nours Clarke oz Secretarie, when he tooke paper in his hand to make a Warrant, fodaynely both his fæte were taben from him : by reason whereof he had luch a tal, that the huckle bone of his thigh was Aroken out of toynt, whereof within the dayes af

ter he dyed.

Herebponthe Gouernour commaunded them to be feartht by his Officers, where they founde hills den buder enery one of their cloathes nert to their fainnes, a bagge of wines dounge: which being taken away, founke fo fylthely, that no man could indure the imell. and in Paule Gamperles bosome, (beeing their principall,or ring-leader) they founde a divellify Boke of Confuration, and the picture of a man made in Cinne, holding in his hande a lcrowle or writing, conterning thele the wordes, Magell, Cumath, Hellbeza : By the fame, were fo plainely manifelted their wicked practiles, that they immediately confessed (without any further trouble) all thete murders and exectable feates that ever they had committed in their life times, as it doth well appeare hereafter.

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The Confession of Paule Gamperle.

Paule Gamperle, alias Poppenhamor, of the age of eight and fiftie yeres, confessed that he had bled the practice of witch-craft from his child-had, and that he had bin trained by in the came by his olde Graundmother, a woman dead many yeres agoe.

In like maner he confessed, that he had murthered in his time by witch-craft and society, about the

number of a hundred small children.

In like maner he confessed, that he had made lame and croked ten of the richest Cittizens of Manchen, because they would not forgive him certaine debts he owed them.

Ju like maner he confessed, that by Witch-craft he had made away two of his Uncles, to come by their

In like maner he confessed ten Church-robberies, fittene Durthers by the high waves side, robberies by night in Darchants sellers by him selfe done four and twentie severall times: and that no locke not doze could withstand him, but by witch-craft he could make sie open.

finally, he confessed that in his life time, he had by night spered eight of his neighbours houses, whereby were burned in they, beddes both men, women, and children, to the number of sixteene: besides divers other mischieses by him committed, to the great annoyances of the whole Countrey.

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The Confession of Anne Gamperle.

Nnc Gamperle his wife, of the age of thise force peres, confessed that in her life time, the had murthered like wife by Witch-craft to the number of a hundred small children.

an like maner the confessed, that the had deformed and made croked, and withall murdered by with-craft, to the number of ninetone olde peo-

ple

In like maner the confessed, that by Witch-craft the had caused an Inkerpers wife to runne into a hotte burning Quen, where the burned her selfe to death: and likewise caused the same womans bushand to be so miserably vered, that he thouse his head into a swilling Tubbe sull of Swines meate, and there smothered him selfe.

In tike maner the confessed, that the had spoyled Cattle in great aboundance, with Corne byon the ground often times: and that the had set fier byon two Dep stacks, which had served a whole Utillage, had not helpe of people prevented it. From the

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The Confession of Simon Gamperle.

Simon Gamperletheir naturall sonue, of the age of two and twentie yeares, contelled that he had murthered by Witchwaft, to the number of thirtie small Children, beside sire old folkes which he likewise made croked and lame, and after killed.

Moreover he confessed, that he had committed nine Church robberies, soure robberies by the high way side, twelve robberies done in Marchants ware-houses: Byot, and Pillage, committed by night sire times: spoyled with Hayle and Compess Cattel and Groundes often times.

Moreover he confessed, that by witch-craft he had made himselfe invincible, by which meanes, he alone set upon size persons at a time, and robbed them, and after killed them every one: with many other practises of thest and murther, which here A omit.

The Confession of Iacob Gamperle.

Acob Gamperle their other Sonne, of the age of one and twentie yeares, confessed that he had murthered to the number of three score and five small Children: beside five old folkes that he had made same and croked, and after murthered.

Moreover, he confessed sive Church robberies, ten Robberies in Marchants houses, soure Robbe

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ries committed by the high way: five houses let on fire, kyots and Thelts by night in the frætes, com-

mitted twelue feuerall times.

Mozeover he confessed, that by Witch-crast he had caused a heard of Cattell in a Tempest to be blowne into a river, and there drowned: and the said Tempest or storme to be so violent, that Trazvellers could hardly travell by the high way: with many other like wicked practises.

The Confession of Vllrich Sehelltibaum.

Lirich Schelltibaum of Detwenge, of the age of the Google and eight yeares, confessed that in his life time, he had murthered by Witch-crast to the number of the score and ten small children, and had made croked and killed thirtie olde folkes.

Moreover, he confessed Bobberies in Churches, and Marchants Sellars, thests and murifers by night, Cattell and Grounds spoyled in such abundance and so often times, that he could not well reckon them.

The Confession of George Smaltes,

Eorge Smaltes Taylor of Peon, of the age of sitting peares, confessed in his life time he had murthered to the number of thirtie live small Children, beside olde people made croked & killed the number of sisteme: Hurders by the high B. way,

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way, kobberies in Aillages, fireing of Houles, kobbing of Churches, I thinke it nædes not to number downer but to conclude, it was his cultome about the rell, to rankke by night dead mens graves, and to make pillage of what he there found whether it were linnen of otherwise: for badder livers then these live were, I thinke are not now remayning byon the earth. Therefore let all Christians pray, that God in his mercy may blesse be all others, from the like practices: and to wede from the face of the earth all such like offenders as he did these, and with the like shame and punishment reward them D God I beseche the.

These assistant contessions being taken before the Gourmour, and other Burgestes of the Cittie of Manchen, they were arraigned, convicted, and condemned: and boon the nine and twentie of July were executed in this maner and forme following.

first, they were all sire brought before the towne house of Manchen, where the Woman (being plack betwirt her two Sonnes) had both her Brestes cut off: with the which Brestes, the Executioner stroke her three times about the face: and in like maner her two Sonnes, who sate on each side of her, were likewise beaten about the face with their mothers Brestes three times appeare. This beeing done in the presence of many people, the Woman had size stripes given her with a whip of twisted where and after, had both her Armes broken with a Whæle, and then set in a settle made of purpose.

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After this, the other five men-Witches, had also like stripes apace, and both their Armes like wise broken with a Whale, and foure of them tyed unto a stake in the same place, and burnt: But Paule Gamperle, the father and maister witch of them all, was spitted alive, and so roasted to death, and after had his body like wise burnt into sinders.

Thus gentle Reader, halt thou heard the life and death of thele live most notozious and wicked Witches. For the truth wheref, let no man make doubt: for it is not onely reported of by many men of god sufficiencie, but translated out of the Dutch Coppy as it was there first imprinted. Therefore let be all in general, fall downe by an our known, and with contrite hartes, desire of his Paicsie, by whose sufferance all they wicked practices were committed, that he will abate the pride and mallice of Sathan, now raigning amongs mankind, and to put in our hartes such strong fayth, that the like assaultes never assayle be, but that

we may ferue him in perfect love
and godlines, who is the migh:
tie Ring of all kinges: to
whom be all prayle,
glory, and dominis
on, for ever.
